NYAS Cymru agreed to share with the Committee statistics relating to the number of children and young people who are in unregulated accommodation.

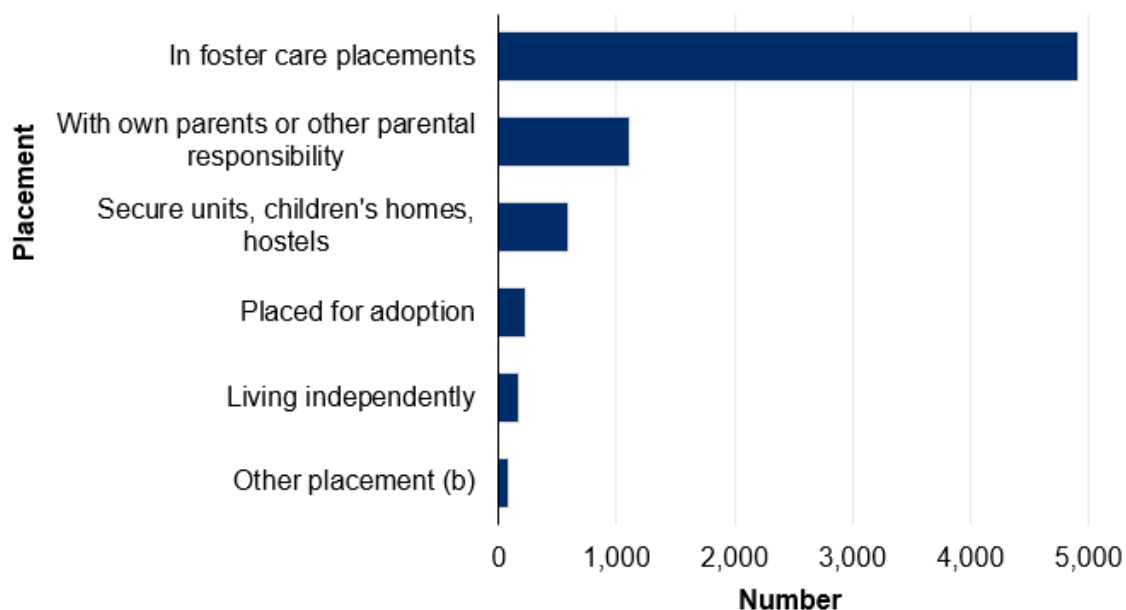
For those children who are still in care, it will be those 'living independently' that are likely unregulated placements. The figure of 122 young people that I cited in the committee oral evidence session was from the same report (Table 1) which listed those leaving care at the date of ceasing to be looked after who were living in..."Semi-independent, transitional accommodation, and self-contained accommodation". We made an assumption that this is unregulated, but again the Welsh Government figures aren't entirely clear. The graph below about 'independent living' while in care above is probably more relevant on reflection, as that is for children who still technically have looked after status.
